The RISE Education program gives primary-age students with a parent in prison access to a vital support system that encourages their learning and development.

Tailored one-on-one support in the classroom on a weekly basis ensures students don't just survive a really difficult time but thrive. Each student is matched with a mentor who supports them academically, socially and culturally.

As part of RISE, SHINE also offers externally evaluated and accredited teacher training seminars. These seminars help teachers and schools better support children with an incarcerated parent.
